
Three dogs with three different stories and personalities, but all with one thing in common: chained outside. It is no life for a dog to live in a plastic box and only be able to sniff the dirt as far as their chain can reach. Humans have domesticated dogs to live in the house with us and to be a part of our family. It is a cold and lonely life for a dog to live without the daily companionship of people.

Do people not realize that dogs feel lonely, scared, and cold? Do they not know that they suffer when sick? The majority of outside dogs that we have taken in have received no vet care for years, if at all. They also lack the comforts of a home, having to live in mud, snow, and rain. They have nothing but a plastic box to huddle in during loud thunderstorms, and they have no protection from predators. Angel Ridge has stepped up for numerous dogs living in these conditions, offering them a better life, filled with love and proper care.

Still Looking for His "Light"

Little 26 lb. Brock, likely a Puggle, lived his entire six years chained to a tree with a dirty plastic dog box to sleep in. Perhaps his owner thought it was enough to bring him food once a day. It wasn't. Not even close. Brock completely missed the

socialization window where dogs learn to trust and love people. He was completely alone outside for 23 hours and 59 minutes a day.

adjusted dog to live in a kennel, regardless of how nice and spacious the kennel is and how loving the volunteers and staff are with him. Now imagine that you are Brock and new people are coming into your space. You've never walked before. You've never had a bath before.

Brock has adjusted somewhat to his new life. It's definitely better than his previous life, but not the life we ultimately want him to have in a loving home. He hears humans and excited dogs in the kennel and approaches the front of his kennel and waits. He loves his walks. We enter his kennel and sprinkle a little food on the floor while we attach a leash. Positive associations are so important. Brock confidently walks with us outside like a little man on a mission. He no longer has a tiny area to sniff; he has an entire farm to explore daily on a leash. As much as Brock loves his walks, his dog walkers find joy in walking him. I see him loving life, and it makes me smile. Brock plays with toys, works puzzles for food, and enjoys his snuffle mat. He has also had several baths, and our bather loves him very

We have faith that Brock has an angel out there who will be selflessly devoted to giving him a real home. It will take time, patience, love, and knowledge. He may never be a dog who wants to snuggle on the couch with you, but who knows? Brock is hoping for a devoted adult home where he is the only dog.

Then there's Moe. Moe was also chained out in the dirt with a filthy dog box to live in and surrounded by rusty equipment and garbage. When Moe was rescued from these conditions, he was severely underweight, as was another hound named Hope that we welcomed to Angel

Ridge.

Moe is a gorgeous Black and Tan Coonhound. Although he came from a situation similar to Brock, his personality is quite different. He is exuberant and loves people. His physical condition was atrocious, and we brought him back to a healthy weight. Moe received flea and tick preventatives, antibiotics for Lyme disease, and medicated baths. He learned to walk on leash, but he obviously had no housetraining or any idea about behavior in a house. He jumped on top of tables, counter-surfed, and generally wreaked

havoc inside, simply because he knew no better. We lovingly worked with him on inside manners, and we all fell in love with Moe.

Fortunately, Moe found a family who also fell madly in love with him. A mom and two children came to meet dogs one weekend. First, they met a different dog. They liked him, but there was no love connection.

Then we brought in Moe. Our crazy hound was on his very best behavior. If he were a little boy, he would have shown up in a suit and tie and said please and thank you, ma'am. Moe was sweet and gentle with everyone. He knew. He chose them wholeheartedly. Lucky for Moe, they chose him, too! Moe now lives in a home with a family who is dedicated to teaching him on a daily basis. They give him snuggles on the sofa, lots of toys and walks, and most importantly, lots and lots of love. Moe has the happy ending that we pray all of our dogs find.

His Resilience Saved His Life

Little Bailey was just a puppy, a baby. He was chained outside and starving to death. My eyes fill with tears when I look at the photos of Bailey when he was skin and bones, his entire skeleton visible. How can someone chain a sweet 7-month puppy outside and then let him almost starve to death?

Thank God for his rescuers who saved him in time and brought him to Angel Ridge where he received the care he needed. This little boy is so special and sweet. Finally, Bailey got to play with toys, snuggle in laps, and take sniffy walks on the farm. At last, Bailey got to be a dog! This resilient little guy made best pals with another young pup, Velvet, and they absolutely loved playing together. Fortunately, it didn't take long for Bailey to find a home where he could live inside and be part of a family.

I could tell you many more stories about these dogs who were never made a part of a

would die. Chief found a home where his owners love him dearly and are committed to teaching him to be his best self.

There was Charlie, a very sweet, large, furry stray who wandered outside for many months, begging for food. His hair was incredibly and painfully matted. His remaining teeth were atrocious, and he received care from a board-certified veterinary dentist. His eye was horribly infected, and a tumor on one eyelid had to be removed. Our director opened her heart and her home to Charlie after losing three older rescue dogs within the span of a few months. Charlie has done wonders to help her broken heart to heal.

I could write a long, sad book about many neglected, unloved outdoor dogs, but we are too busy saving them to write that book.

Cats and Kids Gain Confidence Together by Barb Brown

It was about 14 years ago that I came across an article that intrigued me and has proven to be a "life changer" for my dog and cats. Following the strategy introduced in this article, my husband, John, and I began to read to our cat, Maxine and dog, Gabe.



Maxine was a cat that I trapped at Max's Bathhouse, a grooming salon, in South Park. This happens to be the building that was purchased last year for our Bailey's Cat Haven. Serendipity or fate? You decide.

Maxine was very hissy and non-trusting. John would read to her daily from the newspaper. She began to relax and make eye contact with him. Maxine was learning to trust John, and she eventually allowed him to pet her.

Our next "student" was our dog, Gabe, who was adopted from Angel Ridge Animal Rescue. I read to Gabe every night, and he became more relaxed and confident. For the remaining years of his life, Gabe was my shadow-always near me, watching over me. Just as John and I discovered when reading to our own dog and cats, the animal learns to trust, have a calmer demeanor, and builds a bond with the human who reads to him or her.

This has been confirmed in empirical and anecdotal research over the last decade. Very importantly, these studies have proven that the child who reads to an animal reaps many valuable benefits. Researchers at UC Davis have conducted studies relative to the benefits that are realized when children read to dogs. They found that kids who read to therapy dogs for 15 to 20 minutes a week, over a 10-week period, saw a 30% improvement in reading. (Dave Jones, Reading to Rover: Does it Really Help Children? Veterinary School Says 'Yes', April 16th, 2010)

The child's motivation, confidence, fluency and empathy for animals is increased. Dogs and cats are non-judgmental, so if a child makes a mistake, their captive audience doesn't care, and the child can correct the mistake and keep on reading.

Many schools routinely bring in dogs so that the children who are considered "slow", or reluctant to read, can improve their reading skills, but also their self-esteem. It is an enjoyable, pressure- free experience.

I was excited to introduce our own "Reading to Cats" program when we moved into our new location in South Park. Our socializer volunteers- adults and children-are matched up with a timid or scared cat and they read to them. I added the slow blink technique recommended by renowned cat expert, Jackson Galaxy. Basically, you wait for the cat to make eye contact with you, and then you make a series of very slow blinks. This technique usually gets the cat's attention quickly and starts to build a connection.



At Bailey's Cat Haven, children from Showtime Dance and the South Park library have become involved in the program. They bring a book from home or use one from our small library at Bailey's. The readers all learn the slow blink technique. They are assigned to a cat and read and show the pictures to them. When time is up, they move on to the next cat. Every cat has a reading experience.

This one-on-one experience when they are given full attention, has definitely reduced the cat's stress level and it has built their trust. The children have gained reading experience, and they develop a bond with a cat. Overall, it helps the cat become more adoptable and the children gain confidence in reading aloud in a nopressure situation.

We have been told that this is a very positive experience for the children. More reading sessions are scheduled. I encourage other groups to consider this opportunity with us. Please contact me, Barb Brown, at jacob75293@aol.com for more information.
